The three-day workshop on climate change, heritage interpretation, and community engagement seeks to empower participants with the tools and skills necessary to engage local communities in climate action through the lens of heritage interpretation. Participants will explore the impacts of climate change on cultural heritage sites, understand how these impacts may be perceived locally, and examine best practices for interpreting these to diverse audiences. Through a series of lectures, discussions, and interactive exercises, participants will also learn how to develop effective community engagement strategies and work collaboratively with local stakeholders to build climate resilience and promote sustainability. By the end of the workshop, participants will have gained a deeper understanding of the interconnectedness of climate change, cultural heritage, and community engagement, and be better equipped to create meaningful and impactful projects in their own communities.



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# Learning Outcomes:

- Understand climate change as a phenomenon.
- Understand climate change's impact on local communities.
- Learn the tools to assess the impact of climate change on human communities on the local/regional level.
- Acquire skills to highlight climate change impact on natural heritage and cultural heritage. Raise awareness that local change is related to much larger processes.
- Assess the resources locally and regionally to understand and address climate change.
- Learn how managers engage local communities examples, principles and methods.
- Develop narratives/stories in collaboration with local communities to underscore the connection between climate change and local values/resources.
- Understand how interpretation can engage visitors or local communities to empower active citizenship.
- Learn how to engage visitors and locals through the use of interpretive tools.

- 3. Applicants will be asked to participate in a personal (oral) interview.
